

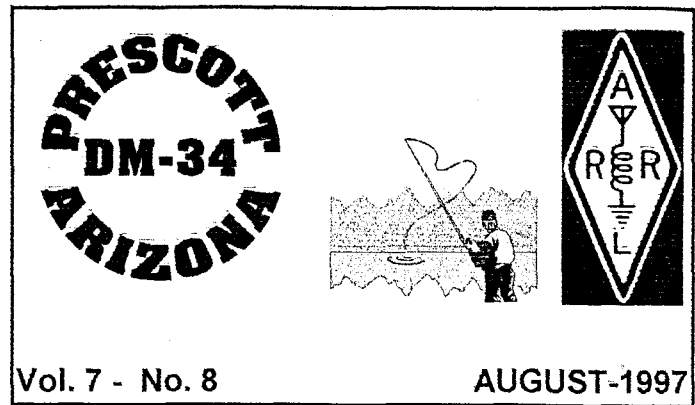

and THE BENEFITS!**

The July meeting was

postponed for a week from it's normal date, so that Cliff Hauser-KD6XH, the ARRL AZ Section Manager could attend. Cliff spoke with those in attendance about some of the challenges facing amateur radio. One point was how the face of amateur radio has changed and what we need to do to keep the hobby going. He stated that the average age of radio amateurs is 52! It is obvious that with the World Wide Web, and other means of communications, amateur radio may be facing a decline. We need to get younger people interested in the hobby. Some of us have done so by being involved with local clubs, schools, and other organizations. But it may not be enough! With the threats to our spectrum, everyone should take an active part in promoting the hobby. Any other organizations you may belong to could be a starting point for prospective amateurs. Service clubs are always looking for guest speakers for their meetings. Local schools are another source, especially for younger persons who may be potential amateurs. Something as simple as a visit to your local school with a demonstration of how local 2-meter repeaters work may spark some interest. The success of the recent SAREX contact was a perfect example. The ARRL has a lot of information and publications that can be passed out. Granted, amateur radio isn't for everyone. However, many out there may not even be aware of what it is and what we can do. Many may not possess the technical ability, but everyone can learn. Maybe you don't like speaking to groups? Hey, you do it on the radio! Why not do it in live in front of an audience. The club has over 60 members,

and if half of you went out and promoted the hobby, that would be like 30 advertisements. Just think of the potential audience we could reach!

On another note, Cliff also talked about the ARRL, it's role, and membership in the organization. The numbers may shock you, but out of 15,000 licensed amateurs in Arizona, only about 25% belong to the ARRL. While membership in the ARRL is not mandatory, there are benefits to being a member. In addition to receiving QST, the monthly magazine published by the ARRL, you also have vast resources available to you. The ARRL is our main connection to governmental issues, licensing, spectrum use, and too many others to list. They are almost the only body we have to promote and preserve the hobby. Just read the articles about technology, new products and product reviews, band threats, regulations, and other related issues. While not all licensed amateurs are active, and many more are only occasional users, most of us make use of the bands and membership in the ARRL benefits us all. For \$31.00 a year, you get QST, the resources of the ARRL, and a strong political voice in Washington DC, with the FCC, and strong relations with manufacturers and distributors of the equipment we use, the Volunteer Examiner program, Field Services Division, and many more. You may have already benefited from the ARRL without knowing it. If you are not already a member of the ARRL, you should look into it. You may learn something. As a final note, there are clubs out there that boast 100% ARRL membership, which means that every club member belongs to the ARRL. While not impossible, our club membership could stand and increase in ARRL membership. Check it out. It doesn't cost anything to look, and while you may not believe it, whether or not you belong to the ARRL, you are benefiting from it. **PRESCOTT FOREST ROAD RALLY**

For those of you who may not be familiar with the Road Rally, it is an "off-road" race sanctioned by the SCCA (Sports Car Club of America). Cars racing in this division must be "street legal" and licensed, but are specially equipped with roll-bars and other safety equipment. Each stage of the rally is timed. However, vehicles traveling from 1 stage to another must observe normal traffic laws. Racers come from all over, some even traveling from the east coast to compete. Since the stages to be run are in the Prescott National Forest, permission must be obtained from the Forest Service. During the race, the FS roads in the race area are closed to normal traffic. In addition to reporting cars as they start and finish, we maintain communications throughout the length of each stage to report any accidents or vehicles on the road that shouldn't be there or cars that have not reached points on the stage.

This year The Road Rally will be held October 3, 4 & 5, and we will need a lot of help for this project.

October 3 (Friday) we will need operators from about 6PM to Midnight in the Camp Wood, Walnut Creek area. October 4 (Saturday) we will need operators from 11AM until about 9PM. This part of the race will be NW of Chino Valley, as in the past. October 5 (Sunday) is the awards only, if you wish to attend.

This year's road rally is classified as a national road rally and will be larger than normal. They are planning for 50 cars. In 1993 we had a national road rally and there were 47 cars. I hope to get enough help to have 2 people at the start of each stage and one at the end, as a minimum. This is in case of an accident we can send one ham with the medical personnel for communications.

We will have a sign-up sheet at both the August and September meetings. We need all the help we can get. Sign up for Friday or Saturday, or both.

There is a party for workers a couple of weeks after the rally and all who helped are invited.

### PRESIDENTS CORNER

#### UPS STRIKE MIGHT DELAY ARRL SHIPMENTS

The current United Parcel Service (UPS) strike very likely will delay deliveries of some shipments from ARRL Headquarters. Fortunately, our Shipping Room Supervisor, Steve Capodicasa, had anticipated the walkout. "Consequently, over a week prior to the actual strike, we had already begun routing our orders through the United States Postal Service," said Circulation Manager Deb Jahnke. "We believe that we were able to divert virtually all customer orders from being left in limbo in the UPS system." But, Jahnke said that since all carriers have suspended their normal service standards, "delays will be inevitable."

ARRL Business Manager Bob Boucher says that nonessential mailings are being held back in hopes the strike won't last long. "In the meantime any items going out will be done via USPS Priority, if the cost is comparable," he said.

UPS delivers approximately 80% of all US packages, and other carriers so far have not been able to pick up the slack. (From the ARRL's ARRL Letter of 8/08/97)

TV occasionally airs live coverage of SAREX activities. Programming is received by satellite dish or may be available through your local cable television network.

### Tuning-In NASA TV:

As March 15, 1997 NASA Television will begin broadcasting via a new satellite that allows reception by a wider audience throughout the continental United States, Alaska and Hawaii. NASA Television is designed to provide real-time coverage of Agency activities and missions as well as resource video to the news media, and educational programming to teachers, students and the general public.

NTV was transmitted on the Spacenet 2 satellite, which is nearing the end of its life cycle. The GE-2 satellite, which was launched in January and is operated by GE Americom, will provide NASA TV with a larger "footprint," or coverage area.

Effective March 15, 1997 NTV is available on GE-2, Transponder 9C at 85 degrees West longitude, vertical polarization, with a frequency of 3880 MHz, and audio of 6.8 MHz. -NASA News For more information, contact:

## PAST PRESIDENTS FORUM.....

### ARRL: No more waiver VE'S

The American Radio Relay League has taken action that is bringing cheers from the organized sector of the disabled ham radio community. This, the result of a new policy approved by the Leagues' Board of Directors that says that ARRL Volunteer Examiners are not to administer exam elements for which they have received credit solely on the basis of a medical exemption.

The Board has also proposed changes in the FCC's Volunteer Examiner rules to require that applicants for a ham radio license that requires a demonstrated knowledge of the code first attempt to pass an

accommodated Morse code test before seeking a medical exemption.

Usually it is easy to find opposition to an ARRL proposal, but not this time. The organized disabled ham community strongly supports the ARRL's effort to close long standing loopholes in the current medical code waiver. Pat Tice, WA0TDA, is Manager of the Courage Handi-Ham System. Handi-Hams represents 1000 disabled hams:

Tice: "Our position is that these are both reasonable and very practical changes that in no way discriminate against hams with disabilities. An examiner who has very limited code proficiency cannot possibly oversee fast code exams."

How does the American Civil Liberties Union, the ACLU, view this ARRL proposal? Valerie Phillips, the spokesperson for the ACLU in Chicago says in effect that this proposal does not warrant ACLU action. This is because no municipality is involved and because no constitutional issues are raised.

ARRL 1st Vice President Steve Mendelsohn, W2ML, says that there is one very good reason why the League, national VEC's and the disabled community are of one mind regarding this proposal:

"No ham that I know of countenances fraudulent testing. That is why the VEC's, the League, the handicapped community and anyone else who values his/her license is going to line up solidly behind this proposal."

At airtime, no other V-E-C has publicly endorsed the ARRL decision or enacted similar rules of its own. How the FCC will view any formal League request on this issue versus the Americans in Disabilities Act remains to be seen. (Via ARRL, RAIN, Newsline)

### Ham Foils Prison Escape

Thomas Sorrow, KE4ITN, of Cleveland, Alabama, was recently recognized by the Alabama Department of Corrections for confiscating electronic parts and schematics for a transceiver from an inmate. The inmate, serving a life without parole sentence for capital murder, was plotting to escape from the maximum security St Clair Correctional Facility at Springville, Alabama. Sorrow, an Extra Class licensee and correctional officer employed at St Clair, credits his hobby for his being able to identify the contraband and to assist in foiling the inmate's escape plot. *From Tom Moore, KL7Q via the ARRL's ARRL LETTER*

### SIX METER RESTRICTIONS IN PLACE FOR AUCKLAND, NEW ZEALAND, HAMS

Hams in Auckland, New Zealand, recently lost the use of the lower portion of 6 meters after a local broadcaster installed a Channel 1 (44-51 MHz) TV transmitter in the Auckland Skytower. As a result, the city again has restrictions on 6-meter operation, and permits issued to hams in that area to operate on the low end of the band have been revoked, although ZL hams retain access to 51 to 53 MHz.

Terry Carrell, ZL3QL, of the New Zealand Amateur Radio Transmitters (NZART) says individual stations

will have to apply for new permits. Carrell explains that hams in New Zealand have "temporary use" of 50.0-50.15 MHz for use only outside of television programming hours. A special permit is required to operate there during TV special programming hours. It's available on application on proof of non-interference to TV reception and physical testing of the station. Carrell said NZART earlier had assurances from the local TV broadcaster that it would not occupy Channel 1 in Auckland.

Carrell also clarified reports elsewhere that the lower part of 6 meters had been sold to broadcasting interests. "This is not a sell-off of any of our 6 meter band but a continuation of the current situation," he said. *From the ARRL's ARRL Letter of 8/01/97*

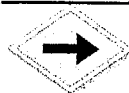

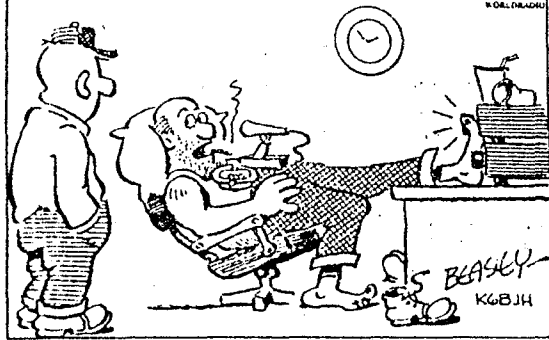
