

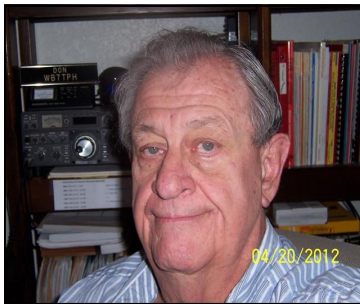

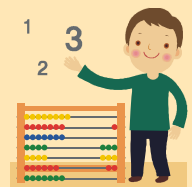
March Program

The Yavapai Amateur Radio Club (YARC) is an ARRL affiliated Special Service Club. The club participates in many activities in the tri-city area by providing communications for local events, emergency communications, and promotion of the hobby throughout the community.

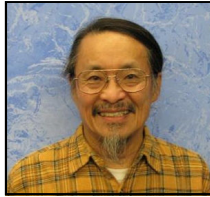
Membership in the YARC is open to any interested amateur or non-amateur alike. Dues are \$20.00/year (Full-time students \$15). The YARC meets at 7:00 p.m. local time on the first Thursday of every month in the Technology Room 404, at the Granite Mountain Middle School, 1800 Williamson Valley Road in Prescott. It is about ½ mile north of Iron Springs road, and all amateurs and non-amateurs as well are invited. Programs of interest are included as part of the meeting.

The weekly Net is held every Wednesday at 7:00 p.m. local time on 146.880- repeater. All amateurs are invited to participate, and visitors are always welcome.

The Yavapai County ARES/RACES Net is held on Monday nights approximately at 7:00 p.m. local time on the 145.290- repeater on Mingus Mountain. A PL of 127.3 is required.

Club Repeater

The YARC 146.880- repeater is located on the hill above Willow Creek road and requires a PL of 100.0 Hz. Our deepest gratitude to Bill Kafka, W2YAV for allowing us to acquire the original club repeater. ■



Minutes of February 7, 2013 Board Meeting at Granite Mountain Middle School, Prescott, Arizona

Present: WB7TPH, W7BJ, AE7CG, KD5VRW, AD7YR, W7HAM, WB7RRQ, and KI6AHH.

The meeting was called to order by WB7TPH at 1807 MST.

Agenda:

1. Correction to January 3, 2013 Board Meeting Minutes: For the time being there will be no change regarding the sending of the club newsletter to a limited number of member recipients by USPS mail.
2. Treasurer's Report: W7BJ distributed the Treasurer's Report containing data inclusive to February 3, 2013.
3. Programs: It would be desirable to have calendar of upcoming general meeting program topics. Possible topics for calendar year 2013: N7CW DX Expeditions; AD7YR Visalia DX Convention; WB7RFY ARCA.
4. Committee Correction: Education and VE Licensing will remain separate functions. The name of "greeters" has now been changed to "ambassadors."
5. Expenses: No further action will be taken at this time regarding the mailing of the club newsletter to member recipients by USPS mail.
6. Equipment Inventory: No news to report regarding the club inventory of equipment. K6VVR and W7BJ are leading the effort.
7. Club Banner: WB7TPH and KB7TRE will serve as custodians of the club banner.
8. Dewey Swap Meet: The date has been moved to October 2013. It may be possible to find another site for the event.
9. Master Calendar on Club Website: WB7TPH indicated that it would aid in planning for club activities to have a master calendar of ham radio events to be posted on the club website. Questions were posed regarding who would assume responsibility for creating and maintaining such a master calendar.
10. Non-club Material on Club Website: How should this subject be handled?
11. Library Archive: What kinds of material should be placed in the club archives? What kinds of material should not be included in the club archives? Where should archival material be stored?
12. Sharlot Hall Museum Operating Event: Will take place on February

14, 2013. A radio station will be set up and operating. YARC members will participate as ambassadors.

13. Facebook Page: KI6AHH and AD7YR led a discussion regarding the pros and cons of YARC having a Facebook page. KI6AHH and AD7YR will serve as an exploratory committee to investigate concerns such as system software enhancements, privacy, and site monitoring.
14. Badge Hangers: W7BJ raised the subject of additional badge hangers for club officers and board members. The board agreed with him about the desirability of obtaining such items.

The meeting was adjourned by WB7TPH at 1856 MST.

Minutes of February 7, 2013 General Meeting

The meeting was called to order by WB7TPH at 1904 MST, and the Pledge of Allegiance was recited by all present.

All in attendance did self-introductions. Visitors were welcomed.

Members were directed to the February 2013 issue of the Yavapai Signal for minutes of the January 3, 2013 general meeting and the latest treasurer's report.

Correction to January 3, 2013 Board and General Meeting Minutes: For the time being there will be no change regarding the sending of the club newsletter to a limited number of member recipients by USPS mail.

New Members: Mike Scibilia (no call), John Szelka (AI1K), Douglas Meyer (KF7YZJ), Jim Zimmerman (N6KZ), and Kenneth Kelly (W7KKK) submitted applications for membership. KB7TRE made a motion that all these applications for membership be approved. K6VVR seconded the motion. All the applicants were unanimously approved by acclamation.

Old Business:

Committee Reports:

1. Event Communications: WA6ZZJ reported about the Sedona Marathon held on February 4, 2013. There were 22 radio operators who participated from YARC (W7YRC) and the VVARA (W7EI). WA6ZZJ also mentioned upcoming public service operating events and asked for volunteers (sign-ups):
 - a. March 29, 2013: ARES®/RACES Wildfire Exercise
 - b. April 26-28, 2013: Whiskey Off-Road Bicycle Event
 - c. May 4, 2013: Whiskey Row Marathon
 - d. May 18-19, 2013: MS-150 Ride the Vortex Bicycle Event, Verde Valley
2. Badges, Patches, and Decals: W7BJ announced the availability of these items.
3. Club Repeater: K6VVR reported that the repeater is functioning satisfactorily, and that he will be doing an on site inspection when the weather gets warmer.
4. Elmers: N7CW reported that he and N6KZ have radio equipment for free or on loan. HF equipment is available on loan.
5. Sharlot Hall Museum Operating Event: KB7TRE reported that the Granite Mountain Middle School Radio Club (K7GMG) will be operating as W7A on February 14, 2013 from 0900 to 1500 MST. He requested \$70 for food, drinks, etc. WB9VGJ made a motion that the financial request be approved. WB6ODR seconded the motion. The request was unanimously approved by acclamation.
6. VE Testing Session: WB9VGJ and WB7TPH reported that the next session would be held at the Jeep Posse Building on Commerce Drive in Prescott on February 9, 2013.
7. Club Sign on Campus: KD5VRW asked that the club give thanks to KB7TRE for having the club's metal sign mounted at the motor vehicle entrance to the Granite Mountain Middle School

campus.

8. Field Day: WB7TPH lamented the fact that he received only one email response to his call for Field Day suggestions. In 2013, does the club want to stage a traditional in-field operating event using emergency power? What does the club want? He reiterated his call for suggestions by email to president@w7yrc.org.
9. Calendar of Events: WB7TPH broached the subject of having a calendar of ham radio events on the club website. He mentioned that K7DF was scheduled as the speaker at the February 7, 2013 YARC general meeting, but had to cancel. WB7RFY would be speaking about ARCA instead. Having a calendar of events would aid in planning events, programs, and speakers. W6CCD would have to receive information to be posted on the calendar.
10. Equipment Inventory: K6VVR and W7BJ are making an inventory of club-owned equipment—what, who, and where.
11. Shirts: K6VVR is in charge of ordering club shirts.
12. Fox Hunt: K6VVR announced that the next fox hunt would be held on Sunday, February 10, 2013. WB9VGJ will hide the transmitter.

New Business:

1. Facebook (Social Media): KI6AHH and AD7YR have been appointed by the board as an exploratory committee to investigate the feasibility of the club having a Facebook page. AD7YR posed the rhetorical question, “Who would use such a page?” He asked for responses to be sent to ad7yr@w7yrc.org. AD7YR will explore various methods and media by which the club can make a broader presence.
2. Balloon Launch: W7JLC announced that the next balloon launch will be held at the Yuma fairgrounds on February 16, 2013 at 0900 MST. The balloon will carry a camera payload and communicate using a cross-band repeater via EchoLink. W7JLC said that more than 800 students have par-

ticipated in the balloon launch program so far.

3. Thanks to K6VVR: KI6AHH asked the club to express its thanks to K6VVR for setting up and coordinating the YARC winter holiday party that was held in January 2013 at the Prescott Steakhouse.
4. Presentation on Emergency Communications: KB7TRE requested that a presentation about emergency communications be given by WA6ZZJ later in calendar year 2013.
5. Motion to Adjourn: WB9VGJ made a motion for adjournment. WB6ODR seconded the motion. The motion was approved unanimously by acclamation at 1948 MST.

50-50 Drawing: KD5VRW drew the winning ticket 394369. KE7ODP was the lucky winner of \$40.

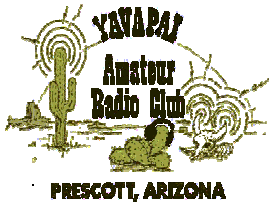
Program and Speaker: Jeff Hanna, WB7RFY, “ARCA: Amateur Radio Council of Arizona”

2. ARCA was started around 1956, and was incorporated in 1967.
3. As the recognized statewide amateur radio group, ARCA coordinates repeater frequency assignments for Arizona.
4. The Ham of the Year award is enabled by ARCA. Member clubs make nominations and former award winners choose the new recipient.
5. The Young Ham of the Year award has only been awarded a few times.
6. ARCA sponsors scholarships for worthy youths to continue their education.

YARC EVENT COMMUNICATIONS...

SEDONA MARATHON...

It's 6:30 in the morning. The outdoor temperature is in the low 30's with a promise of going up to the low 60's by the end of the day. Over 2,300 runners are getting ready to run a Full or 1/2 Marathon, 10K or 5K event while taking part in the Sedona Marathon.

There are twenty three amateur radio operators representing the Yavapai Amateur Radio Club and the Verde Valley Amateur Radio Association arriving at different positions on the race route to provide communications for the event. Seventeen will be manning the nine Aid Stations on the route, four will be in the Course Marshall vehicles with their radio equipment and two will be at net control to direct the flow of radio traffic on the air.

Just what does our communications include at these events? Communications will start off with our operators arriving at their assigned locations. They let us know if the event volunteers have arrived and if the necessary supplies are at the location. Once the event starts radio traffic will turn to keeping track of the first few runners and restocking Aid Stations that are running low on supplies (water, cups, fruit, etc.). There may be runners that are for some reason unable to complete the course so rides are called in for them. We are also there for the safety of the people taking part. As the event begins to wind down it is time to start tracking the last runners/walkers so that Aid Stations and communications locations can be shut down as the last participants pass. When all are accounted for the net can be closed...

WHY WE DO THIS.....

What motivates our members to get up in the wee hours of the morning and in this case, drive many miles to do what we do?? Some people may think of us as a little touched in the head.. Some will say we are doing a good thing.. Others may even call us dedicated.. Then there are the event organizers who thank us for our service and say "we couldn't do these events without your help", "you are essential to our event being a success". Then there is the event participant who passes the location you are sta-

tioned at and says "thank you for being here". This is why we do what we do..... To give back to our communities and support Amateur Radio in a meaningful way.

Amateur radio has a long standing tradition of providing support in events where the official sponsoring organization cannot provide all the communications required for adequate public safety. Competent service rendered by amateurs has proven valuable, and often essential, to public safety in these events by providing rapid alerting of officials when people need help.

The amateur mission in public service events is accomplished by providing communications for officials responsible for the event and public safety. As amateurs, we are not responsible for that safety. We facilitate the mission of officials who are, and can help by providing communications in depth over the full geographical area of the event.

Our mission is to communicate, not administrate, for the responsible officials. Our job is to pass their information and emergency requests back and forth with speed and accuracy.

The YARC Event Communications schedule so far for 2013 is:

**April 26 - 27 - 28, 2013 The Whiskey Off Road
Mountain Bike Event**

This will be the third year for this being a three day event. Last year we used 18 operators on Friday and 25 each day Saturday and Sunday. Signups are under way and they will continue at the March and April YARC meetings. **This being the next event on the calendar, planning is now underway for the three day operational period. If you haven't already signed up, please plan to do so as soon as you can. Check your calendars and get your name on the list. You don't have to sign up for all three days (if you can it will be great). Pick a day you are available to operate and let me know.**

May 4, 2013 The Whiskey Row Marathon

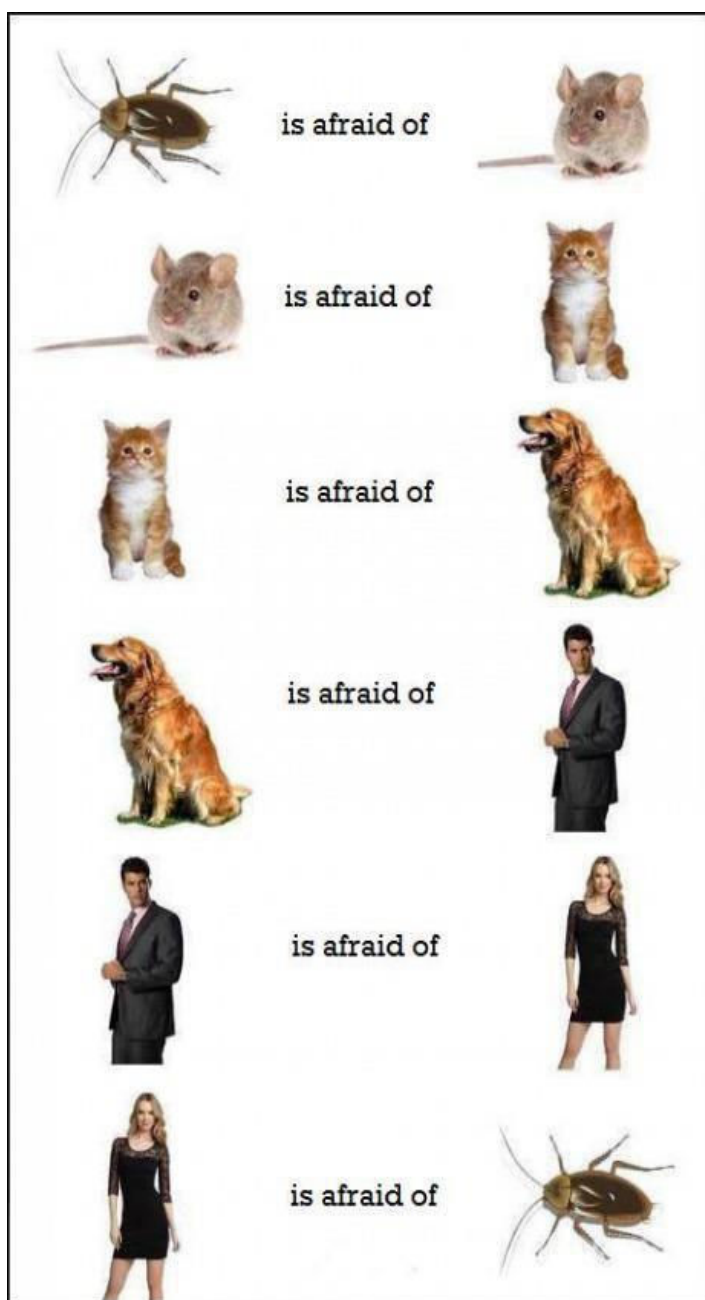
One week later will be YARC's long standing participation in the Whiskey Row Marathon in support of the Prescott YMCA. For this event we typically use 18 to 20 operators. There again, some signups are already in and will continue at the March and April YARC meetings. **About five more operators are needed as of this date.**

May 18 - 19, 2013 **The MS-150 Ride the Vortex
Bicycle Event in the Verde Valley**

This event is currently in the very early planning stages and signups will begin shortly. Being a two day event we will once again need 23 to 25 operators per day. This is another event that will be coordinated with the VVARA.
